Day 1

Budapest - Vehicle - Lake Balaton - Vehicle - Zagreb

All day

In the morning, we set off for the picturesque Lake Balaton. With its attractive scenery, Lake Balaton has become an excellent holiday resort in Hungary. It is affectionately called the "Hungarian Sea" by Hungarians and has gradually become the favorite tourist destination for tourists from all over the world. After the tour, we will cross directly into Croatia and head to the capital Zagreb. This is a city with a tradition of resisting invaders. It has been baptized by artillery fire, but its buildings are still well preserved. The old town is full of beautiful Gothic buildings, Mediterranean cuisine, locally produced wine, and the optimistic and enthusiastic Croatians, which will give you an unforgettable travel experience. After arriving in Zagreb, we will visit a series of local landmarks to fully experience the city's historical, cultural heritage and religious culture.

Morning

Lake Balaton

Lake Balaton in Hungary is the largest lake in Central Europe. While not as turbulent as the ocean, on sunny days, the rippling blue waves, dotted with white sails, and circling seagulls create a captivating coastal landscape. The lake's climate can be just as unpredictable as the ocean itself. The lake region, with its captivating scenery, has become a world-renowned Hungarian tourist destination.

Night

Cathedral of Zagreb

Zagreb Cathedral is a Catholic church in Zagreb, the capital of Croatia. Zagreb Cathedral is the centre of the Catholic Church in Croatia. Zagreb Cathedral is the most famous building in Croatia. The towers on the left and right sides of the entrance are 105 meters high, making it the tallest building in Croatia. The church was built in 1094, destroyed in 1242 during the Tatar invasion, and rebuilt in Gothic style at the end of the 13th century. After the Ottoman army retreated in the 17th century, construction of towers began again and the architectural style was changed to Baroque. The Zagreb earthquake of 1880 severely damaged both Zagreb and the church, after which the church was rebuilt in the Gothic Revival style.

Croatian National Theatre in Zagreb

The theatre grew out of the first city theatre which opened in 1834 and was located in what is now the Old Town Hall. The theatre was originally founded in 1860 as the Croatian National Theatre and received government support in 1861, placing it on the same level as many other European national theatres. At the entrance to the theatre there is a wall fountain sculpture of the Well of Life, designed in 1905 by the Croatian artist and sculptor Ivan Meshtrović. The theater has also seen many international artists, including Franz Liszt, Sarah Bernhardt and others. Currently, the Croatian National Theatre combines performance venues for theatre, opera and ballet. On October 14, 1995, the theater celebrated its 100th anniversary.

Holy Mary's column

The Virgin Mary column with angels and fountain was built by Anton Dominique Fenkorn in 1865, and the fountain by Hermann Bolet in 1880-1882. This monumental column in front of Zagreb Cathedral is a unique symbol of the Kaptol region.

Muzej prekinutih veza

The Museum of Broken Relationships is located in Zagreb, Croatia. The museum displays tokens of love given to each other by lovers from all over the world, including books, baseball caps, teddy bears, etc. Each souvenir comes with a story about it and its original owner. In addition to lovers, there are also some items given by deceased parents to their children. There is a cafe in the museum with a quiet environment, which is a good place to relax.

All day

In the morning, we will set off for Plitvice Lakes National Park, which is known as the Jiuzhaigou of Europe. The national park consists of 16 lakes connected one by one along the mountain trails. Among the dense mountains, countless layers of limestone barriers form natural dams, connecting lakes that are as beautiful as a fairy tale wonderland. The water of the lake has a special color. Calcium forms bronze on the surface of the trees in the water, which is smooth, dazzling and immortal, forming a rare underwater jade tree wonder. Surrounded by green meadows, rushing streams and waterfalls, and clear lakes, it is like a paradise on earth. Take a stroll along the lake trail, accompanied by the sound of clear flowing water and waterfalls, and your body and mind can fully experience the tranquil atmosphere of being away from the hustle and bustle for a moment. After the tour, you will be taken to your hotel in Zadar or its surroundings for check-in and rest.

Morning

Plitvice Lakes National Park

With its exceptional natural beauty, this area has always attracted nature lovers, and already on 8 April 1949, it was proclaimed Croatia's first national park. The process of tufa formation, which results in the building of the tufa, or travertine, barriers and resulted in the creation of the lakes, is the outstanding universal value, for which the Plitvice Lakes were internationally recognised on 26 October 1979 with their inscription onto the UNESCO World Heritage List.

Day 3

Zadar - Vehicle - **Split** - Vehicle - **Dubrovnik**

All day

In the morning, visit Zadar, a city with a strong religious atmosphere. The old city still retains the narrow streets and buildings of the Middle Ages, making you feel like traveling through time and space and going back to the past. Modern art installations popular with tourists have been added next to the pier: the Sea Organ and Salute to the Sun - Solar Flashing Lights. Then we went to Split, the second largest city in Croatia. The whole city is full of the charm of the ancient Roman Empire. The towering ancient Roman palace Diocletian's Palace was once a place for entertainment and leisure for the ancient Roman rulers. It is now listed as a UNESCO World Cultural Heritage. The history of this city is estimated to be more than 1,700 years. After the tour, we took a bus to Dubrovnik. This thousand-year-old city has been pushed to the forefront in recent years due to the "King's Landing" scene in the "Game of Thrones" series, and has become a more popular tourist destination.

Zadar (1 hour, visit the Zadar Sea Organ and Monument to the Sun - Solar Flashing Lights) → **Split** (1 hour, visit the World Cultural Heritage: Diocletian's Palace) → **Dubrovnik**

Morning

Zadar Sea Organ

Architect Nikola Bašić was inspired by the sound of waves hitting rocks at the beach when he was a child, and designed Zadar's seafront into a giant sea organ. The design uses waves and 35 pipes of varying lengths and thicknesses hidden under the stone steps. When the waves push and air rushes into the pipes, a resonant sound like a thick organ is emitted. Due to the different sizes and speeds of the waves and the different calibers and lengths of the pipes, an ever-changing, melodious and undulating tone is produced. The installation, completed in 2005, won the European Urban Public Space Award the following year.

Monument to the Sun

Greeting to the Sun is a solar installation located at the western tip of Zadar Peninsula, Croatia, at the entrance to the port, next to the Sea Organ. Designed by Nikola Basic, it is a circular structure with a diameter of 22 meters, consisting of three hundred multi-layered glass panels, with photovoltaic solar panels underneath. The lighting elements installed in the disc are turned on at night, emitting colorful light. It symbolizes communication with nature, interaction with light, while the nearby Sea Organ represents communication with sound. Greeting to the Sun can display the corresponding feast days of the saints of the church on the Zadar Peninsula according to the altitude of the sun on different dates, making it like a calendar. Marine scientists participated in the collaboration.

These solar panels absorb light energy and convert it into electricity. In addition to the installation itself, it can also supply half of the total energy required for lighting on the Zadar seaside.

Diocletian's Palace

Diocletian's Palace is a Roman palace built between 295 AD and 305 AD, covering an area of nearly 4 hectares. Augustus Diocletian of the Eastern Roman Empire lived here after his abdication. It is located in Split, Croatia, and is a magnificent seaside fortress and luxurious giant country villa. The palace is rectangular in plan, with two 11-meter-wide arcades in the center. The front part of the palace is the bedroom, with views of the sea and the Dalmatian coast. The rear part is the court. The palace was severely damaged during the invasion of the Avars. After the Avars retreated in 639, the palace ruins were converted to other uses by refugees from the city of Salona. In 1979, the site was listed as a World Cultural Heritage.

Day 4

Dubrovnik - Vehicle - Neum

All day

In the morning, we will visit Dubrovnik. The Nobel Prize-winning writer George Bernard Shaw once said: Those who want to see the beauty of heaven should come to Dubrovnik. I'm not exaggerating, Dubrovnik is a place that makes you fall in love at first sight. This wealthy city, once a hub for sea and land trade on par with Venice, suffered from bombardment during the Yugoslav period. It was later rebuilt under the supervision of UNESCO and the European Union and developed into a popular tourist destination. Exploring this Game of Thrones scene - King's Landing in person, you will feel like walking into a scene on the screen. Visit the city's famous sights: the Old Town, the city walls, the Governor's Palace, the Franciscan Church and the monastery. You can also take a cable car up the mountain to overlook this pearl of the Adenian Sea and take in the beauty of the entire city. After the tour, you will drive to Neum or its surrounding hotels to check in and rest.

Morning

Old City of Dubrovnik

Dubrovnik is a city with relatively well-preserved medieval architecture in Europe. It is known as the "city museum" and was listed as a World Cultural Heritage by UNESCO in 1979. There are many historical sites here, and the buildings are in Roman, Gothic, Renaissance and Baroque styles. At the same time, the islands here are scattered, the forests are lush, the sea water is clear, the sunshine is abundant, and the coastal scenery is charming. It is a tourist attraction. George Bernard Shaw once said, "If you want to see what heaven looks like, then go to Dubrovnik!"

Walls Of Dubrovnik

The ancient city wall is a defensive stone wall surrounding the old city. It is 1,940 meters long and 25 meters high at the sea. It is the largest and most complete complex structure of the city wall in Europe. It has stood in southern Croatia since the 7th century and is considered one of the greatest defense systems in the Middle Ages. It has never been destroyed by the enemy. In 1979, the Old Town of Dubrovnik and a large part of the city wall were listed as a World Cultural Heritage by UNESCO.

The Rector's Palace

The Governor's Palace is known as the most beautiful building on the Croatian coast. The building itself combines Gothic and Renaissance styles. From the 14th to the 19th century, the Governor's Palace was the office of the Governor of the Republic of Ragusa.

Franciscan Church and Monastery

It is a religious building located in the Croatian city of Dubrovnik, including a monastery, a church, a library and a pharmacy. The pharmacy in the monastery is the third oldest pharmacy still in operation in the world.

Afternoon Transportation: Driving from Dubrovnik to Neum

Day 5

All day

Today we will start our journey in Bosnia, which was one of the six socialist republics of the former Yugoslavia. Our first stop will be the Stone City built in Rome, now listed as a World Heritage Site. Next we will go to the holy land of Medjugorje. Stornedjugorje has become an important pilgrimage site for Catholics and the third most visited revolutionary site in Europe. Every year, more than a hundred pilgrims go to the ancient city of Mostar, which is full of historical traces, and stand on the top of the exquisitely shaped and magnificent world heritage site: the High Arch Bridge, to capture the picturesque beauty on both sides of the river. After admiring the poetic and picturesque ancient city, take a bus to Sarajevo.

[Wednesday] Itinerary:

Neum → World Cultural Heritage: Stone Town-Pochitli (30 mins) → Mejugorje (30 mins) → Blagaj (30 mins) → Mostar → The Old Bridge In Mostar (outside visit, 40 mins) → Sarajevo

Morning

Pochitli

This is the "Stone City" Pochitli described by Nobel Prize winner in Literature Ivo Andrić. Looking down from the air, Pochitli is like a natural amphitheater. The stone houses, mosques, fortresses and other buildings built on the mountainside form the unique and beautiful appearance of this ancient city. In 1383, the Bosnian King Tvrtko I built a fortress here, which marked the beginning of the 600-year history of changes in this fortress. In the 15th century, when the Hungarians reinforced the city walls, the defenders and craftsmen had built dense residential areas under the fortress; in the 16th century, the Ottomans not only added mosques and madrassas, but also developed a complete market with public baths and caravanserai inns; in the 18th century, the threat from the Venetians prompted the Ottoman rulers to continuously upgrade the fortifications. During the Austro-Hungarian period, Pochitli lost its military value and was largely abandoned. In the 1960s, the dilapidated Stone Town became an artist center, and during the Tito era, it attracted creators from all over the Balkans to seek inspiration. During the Bosnian Civil War in 1996, it was severely damaged and was listed as one of the world's top 100 endangered heritage sites by the World Monuments Watch. The permanent protection plan launched in 2000 continues to this day, bringing new life to this stone city that has witnessed six hundred years of the collision of civilizations. In 2007, it was included in the World Cultural Heritage Tentative List, continuing its transformation from a military fortress to a common heritage of mankind.

Mejugorje

It is about 25 kilometers from Mostar and close to the Croatian border. Međugorje, together with the villages of Biaković, Vionica, Miletina and Šurmantsi, forms a Catholic parish with about 5,000 residents. As the city where the Virgin Mary apparitions took place, Mettigorje is considered one of the most important Marian shrines in the world.

The Old Bridge In Mostar

Located in the center of Mostar, it was once described as "a rainbow welcoming the Milky Way" and is one of the famous attractions in the entire Balkan Peninsula. The style of the ancient stone bridge is in harmony with the surrounding buildings made of ancient stones and the ancient streets paved with round cobblestones, fully demonstrating the quaint customs and artistic style of Bosnia in the 16th century. In 2005, the bridge and the surrounding area were listed as a World Heritage Site by UNESCO.

Afternoon Transportation: Driving from Mostar to Sarajevo

Day 6

Sarajevo - Vehicle - Belgrade

All day

In the morning, we will visit Sarajevo, which was reborn after the fire. It was once an important gateway to the Eastern world in history. It is a city that brings together different religions and cultures and has a different European style. Sarajevo was rated by Lonely Planet as one of the top ten cities in the world worth traveling. Its profound historical marks, such as the Latin Bridge assassination that triggered the First World War and the encounter line between Eastern and Western cultures on the ground, have been preserved in the old city. Sarajevo's rebirth and transformation took place in the modern buildings of the new town. We left Sarajevo in the afternoon and headed for the Serbian border, arrive in Belgrade, the capital of Serbia, at dusk.

Sarajevo → Sarajevo Old Town (1 hour) → Tunnel of Hope (Optional, 30 mins) → Belgrade

Sarajevo

Because of its religious diversity, Sarajevo is known as the "Jerusalem of Europe". Until the late 20th century, Sarajevo was the only city in Europe where mosques, Catholic churches, Orthodox churches and synagogues could coexist. It is well-known in China because of the movie "Walter Defends Sarajevo" and the Yugoslav War.

Tunnel of Hope

The Sarajevo Tunnel was a tunnel built between 1992 and 1995 during the Siege of Sarajevo in the Bosnian War. The tunnel was built by the Bosnian Army to connect the city of Sarajevo with the Sarajevo Airport. The tunnel not only provided food, military supplies and humanitarian aid to Sarajevo, but also became an important way to bypass the arms embargo and provide weapons to the defenders. Many people fled Sarajevo through this tunnel.

Afternoon Transportation: Driving from Sarajevo to Belgrade

Travel distance: 300km Travel time: 4Hour20Minute

Day 7

Belgrade - Vehicle - Budapest

All day

In the morning, we will visit Belgrade, which is located in the core of the Balkan Peninsula. Belgrade, with the title of Balkan Peninsula, was the capital of the Yugoslav Federation. We will admire famous landmarks such as Belgrade Fortress, Church of Saint Sava, House of Flowers and St. Mark's Church, Serbian Parliament Building. In the afternoon, drive to Budapest, the capital of Hungary.

Special gift: 1-hour Belgrade Citywalk, led by a local Chinese tour guide to explore the capital of Serbia, located at the confluence of the Sava River and the Danube River. Walk slowly through the cobblestone streets, listen quietly to stories of the past, and appreciate this city full of historical charm and unique charm.

Belgrade Fortress

The Belgrade Fortress is located in the city of Belgrade, Serbia, and consists of the Old Castle (Upper Town and Lower Town) and Kalemegdan Park. The fortress is located in the city of Belgrade and is a specific historical core of the city. As one of the most important representatives of Belgrade's heritage, it has been protected since the war and is the first officially declared cultural monument in Serbia. The site was declared a cultural monument of special importance in 1979 and is under the protection of the Republic of Serbia. It is the second residence of Belgrade's most visited tourist attraction, Skadarlija Park.

Temple of Saint Sava

The Temple of Saint Sava is a Serbian Orthodox church which sits on the Vračar plateau in Belgrade, Serbia. It is the largest Orthodox church in Serbia and one of the largest Eastern Orthodox churches. The Temple of Saint

Sava ranks among the largest churches in the world. It is the most recognizable building in Belgrade and a national landmark.

House of Flowers

Also known as the Flower House, it is the cemetery of Tito, a famous leader of the Yugoslav Federation. Since Tito loved to grow flowers during his lifetime, his body was buried in the flower house after his death. Under Tito's leadership, Yugoslavia was in a golden age. To this day, people go to Tito's tomb to offer their own flowers to express their remembrance of Tito.

Church of Saint Mark

The Church of St. Mark is a Serbian Orthodox church located in the Tašmajdan park in Belgrade. It was built in the Serbo-Byzantine style by the Krstić brothers and was completed in 1940. It was completed on the site of a previous church dating back to 1835. Today, it is one of the largest churches in the country.

National Assembly of Serbia

The office of the Serbian Parliament was built in 1936. It is one of the landmarks of Belgrade and one of the most imposing buildings in Belgrade. This gorgeous Baroque-style building looks majestic and magnificent, and from a secular perspective, it highlights the glory of Yugoslavia, a great European country at that time.
